Luke chapter 21, verses 27-28 say, "And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, straighten up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." That image of straightening up really speaks to me. Think of all the things that have people bowed low at the moment, those things that are really dragging people down. Straighten up! Your redemption is near! Christ's return and our redemption will see the end of being bowed low, so that we can lift our heads! Nothing will drag us down now!

That will be the final gift to outweigh all gifts, ever. What we anticipate during Advent and celebrate at Christmas is the great beginning of the mighty expectation of the final redemption.
